



## QUICK TIPS: OTHER SOURCES

### Google Books

Google Books (<http://books.google.com/>) contains an ever-increasing number of books online. It can be accessed from the drop-down menu at the top of the Google main search page. In many cases, these are available in their entirety for free. However, in many other cases, only selected parts are available because of copyright restrictions. In addition, these “previews” of books cannot be downloaded. In such cases, if you would like to get the actual book rather than only part of it, use the Discovery or Books tabs on the Hofstra home page to search for an edition in the library. If we do not have it, you can use Hofstra’s interlibrary loan service (see below) to request it from another library.

### Google Scholar

Google Scholar (<http://scholar.google.com/>) provides a way of identifying many scholarly articles and books. Like Google Books, it can be accessed from the drop-down menu at the top of the Google main search page. However, in most cases Google Scholar provides no link to a free version of the complete texts. To get the text of scholarly articles you find using Google Scholar, use the Articles tab on the Hofstra Library home page to search for the article and then if that does not work use the Journals tab to see if we have the journal for the date in which the article was published. If we do not have it at Hofstra, use our interlibrary loan service (see below) to order it from another library. There is sometimes a shortcut: Google Scholar will on occasion provide direct links to articles in Hofstra databases.

### WorldCat

WorldCat is “the world's largest network of library content and services.” There is a free version available to anyone on the Web (<http://www.worldcat.org/>) and the commercial version you can access from the Hofstra Library Web site in the databases area (use the alphabetical list). This version provides more information about books in libraries throughout the world than the free one. If you cannot find enough books at Hofstra, a search in WorldCat may prove useful. To get a book that you find through WorldCat and we do not have at Hofstra (check the catalog), use our interlibrary loan service (see below).

### Hofstra Interlibrary Loan

This service is available from the Hofstra Library home page (under Popular Services) and is free to all Hofstra students and faculty. Register yourself and order books and articles you cannot get at Hofstra. Most items Hofstra does not have, we can obtain for you from this service.
